- 1) WHO + WHAT (Intransitive)
- He travels
- 2) WHO + WHAT (transitive verb + **direct object**)
- He watched TV
- 3) WHO + WHAT (transitive verb + **direct object**) + HOW (manner)
- He drives a car slowly
- 4) WHO + HOW OFTEN (adv of frequency) + WHAT (transitive verb + direct object)
- He rarely drives a car
- He rarely drives a car slowly
- 5) WHO + WHAT (transitive verb + direct object) + HOW (manner) + WHERE
 - He drives a car slowly in the city
 - In the city, he drives a car slowly
 - He rarely drives a car slowly in the city

5b) WHO + WHAT (verb of movement) + WHERE (destination) + HOW (manner)

- He ran home quickly
- 6) WHO + WHAT (transitive verb + direct object) + HOW (manner) + WHERE + WHEN
 - He drives a car slowly in the city on Sundays.
 - On Sundays, he drives a car slowly in the city.
 - In the city on Sundays, he drives a car slowly.

6b) WHO + WHAT (verb of movement) + WHERE (destination) + HOW (manner) + WHEN

- He ran home quickly yesterday
- Yesterday, he ran home quickly
- 7) WHO + WHAT (transitive verb + direct object) + HOW (manner) + WHERE + WHEN + WHY
- He drives a car slowly in the city on Sundays <u>because</u> there is a speed camera.
- He drives a car slowly in the city on Sundays to avoid a speeding fine.
- On Sundays, he drives a car slowly in the city <u>because</u> there is a speed camera.
- In the city on Sundays, he drives a car slowly to avoid getting a speeding fine.

DOUBLE OBJECT PHRASES!!

- 1) WHO + WHAT (transitive verb + **direct object** + <u>indirect object</u>)
 - He read the book to me
 - He read me the book
 - They gave the prize to him
 - They gave him the prize
 - He cooked dinner for me
 - She spoke to me about the lesson
